

#### How Can We Have Unity Among Christians if as Catholics We Aren't United?

This week in place of my bulletin article, I have decided to publish the statement from the Vatican Information Service about the catechesis that Pope Francis made at his general audience on June 19, 2013 which takes place every Wednesday at the Vatican.

VATICAN CITY, 19 JUNE 2013 (VIS) - Pope Francis dedicated his catechesis of the Wednesday general audience to the expression "of the body" that the Second Vatican Council used to indicate the nature of the Church: the Church is the body of Christ. The

Pope recalled the text of the conversion of Saul, who became Paul, in order to explain how the Apostle, with that experience, tells us how profound the union between Christians and Christ is. "The image of the body helps us to understand this deep bond between Church and Christ, which St. Paul particularly developed," the Pope said. "The Church...is a living body...and this body has a head, Jesus, who guides, nourishes, and sustains it...(But), the same way that in a body it is important that the lifeblood courses for it to live, so must we allow Jesus to work in us, so that His Word might guide us, His Eucharistic presence might nourish and inspire us, and so that His love might give strength to our love for our neighbor." "In the Church, therefore," the pontiff continued, "there is a variety, a diversity of tasks and functions. There is no dull uniformity but the richness of the gifts that the Holy Spirit distributes. There is communion and unity: all are in relation to one another and all combine to form a single vital body, profoundly connected to Christ. Let us remember this well: being part of the Church means being united to Christ and receiving from



Him the divine life that makes us to live as Christians. It means remaining united to the Pope and bishops who are instruments of unity and communion and it also means learning to overcome selfishness and divisions, to understand one another better, and to harmonize the variety and richness of each one. In a word, loving God and the persons around us, in our families, parishes, and associations, better. Body and limbs must be united in order to love!"

Speaking extemporaneously, the Holy Father added: "Unity is

always greater than conflict. Conflicts, if they aren't resolved well, separate us from one another, separate us from God. Conflict can help us grow but it can also divide us. Let's not take the path of division and struggle between one another. All united with our differences, but always united: this is Jesus' path."

"How much damage is caused to the Church by divisions among Christians, by being apart, by narrow interests! The divisions among us," he continued, "but also the divisions between the communities: evangelical Christians, orthodox Christians, Catholic Christians, why are we divided? We must try to bring unity...We must pray together as Catholics and also with other Christians, that the Lord grant us unity, unity between us. But how will we have unity among Christians if we aren't capable of having it among us Catholics? Of having it in our family? How many families fight and are divided! Seek unity, the unity that makes the Church. Unity comes from



Jesus Christ. He sends us the Holy Spirit to create unity."

We ask this through Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns as our Eternal Priest.



#### June 16, 2024 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

My mother and father fell in love with each other rather quickly. It was only a span of two months between their first meeting and quiet betrothal. They waited for a significant period of time before going public with the happy news. It simply wasn't time. Love's strength and speed can sprout scandal in public. Until the big reveal, they gave the outside world only little hints, gestures, and riddles.

Something like this — but even more wonderful — is at play when Mark says of Jesus, "**he did not speak to them without a parable, but to his disciples in private he explained everything.**" Jesus is the long-awaited messiahking, but his identity as the Lord and Son of God is so new, surprising, and scandalous to human ears that the big reveal would have to wait. Thus, his parables are riddles, meant to conceal more than reveal. Even the disciples — who hear

*...it simply isn't time yet.* things explained directly — barely grasp what he is up to. It's only at the cross

that Jesus' love for Israel and the world is explicitly revealed. Until then, much stays hidden and comes in riddles.

So it goes with us, too. I wonder at times why doesn't the Lord just speak to us directly in prayer about what we should do, or how to fix our problems. Or why doesn't he reveal himself directly to powerful leaders who are slow to act? Why does he allow life so often to be confounding, contradictory, and crazy? Because it simply isn't time yet. One glorious day, it will be. Until then, he teaches us in riddles, and only sometimes explains them.

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June is the Month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus so let us continue to show our devotion and reflect on the following.

As we look at the images of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, we notice many symbols. Each of these expresses some aspect of God's love for us. **Flames:** The Sacred Heart of Jesus burns with divine love.

In the Gospel, Jesus says that He has come to set fire to the earth—the fire that He longs to set is the fire of divine love, the fire of the Holy Spirit, in each human heart. One prayer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus says, "Oh Heart of Jesus, burning with love for us, inflame our hearts with love for You." The Sacred Heart of Jesus is aflame with love for you and for me, and in this month, He wants to set our hearts on fire with His love, to consume all that is not His love, and for this fire of His love to spread to others who so need to know God's love for them.

**Rays of Light:** The Sacred Heart of Jesus is surrounded by rays of light, as if rays of light are emanating from it. In the Gospel of John, Jesus says He is the light of the world. What does light do? It shines in and dissipates the darkness, and it reveals the truth. The Sacred Heart of Jesus reveals to us the eternal truth of God's love for us, bringing the light of God's love into the darkness of our sin and suffering, our fear and doubt. **Crown of Thorns:** We remember that during His Passion, the soldiers placed a crown of thorns on Jesus' head. In one of His revelations to St. Margaret Mary, Jesus told her that the crown of thorns symbolizes our individual sins, which prick His heart.

**The Cross:** In the Gospels, Jesus hangs upon the cross as He dies for us. In the image of the Sacred Heart, the Heart of Jesus no longer hangs upon the Cross, but rather the Cross stands atop the Sacred Heart, as if to say that the Heart of Jesus is what supported the Cross and what supports us when we have to bear a cross. It was the Divine Love of the Sacred Heart that willingly accepted death on the Cross for our sake, and it is that same Divine Love that transforms the Cross into the most powerful act of redemption.

**The Open Wound:** After Jesus dies on the cross, a soldier pierces His Heart with a lance, and blood and water flow out—the mercy of God floods the world. The open wound in the image of the Sacred Heart shows us that the Heart of Jesus is always open to us, His mercy always available to us, that He never closes His Heart to us.

At this moment in our world, torn by so much violence and suffering, we need to let our own hearts be filled with the love of the Sacred Heart, so that the flames of God's love reach the world through us. So let us ask for two graces this month: first, the grace to be convinced of God's love for each one of us personally, manifested in the Sacred Heart of Jesus; second, for the grace to show that love to all those around us, to love others as Jesus has loved us.

#### **Living Parables**

Whenever someone begins a sentence with, "This parable means..." I roll my eyes. (Sometimes I do this inwardly, to be polite. But I still do it.)

We have a tendency to treat the parables like our mom's favorite casserole recipe. *Ah yes,* we think as we sit down to dinner, smiling as we inhale the aroma of childhood. *Good ol' mushy-chicken-rice-thing. I recognize you. I know exactly what you are. I don't even have to think about you.* 


Parables are often presented as an example of how God stoops to meet the limits of human understanding: truth, but in a cute little story! And while it's certainly true that the parables of Christ — each word, each detail, each character — are painstakingly crafted to suit the imagination and intelligence of man, we need to be careful how we think about that.

Sometimes we have a tendency to think of parables as simple and formulaic. We consign them to the genre of bedtime stories, whose point is to soothe, to lull. But these are stories that are meant to keep us awake. They are meant to keep us wondering. When Christ spoke of the mustard seed, he was speaking the truth in words that his disciples needed to hear two thousand years ago. But he was also speaking to you today. And he was speaking to you tomorrow, and next year, and three years from now, and on your deathbed. If you read this parable on each of those occasions, you will hear something different each time. The parable, you see, is something alive.

It doesn't change, exactly, because the truth never changes. But people change, and what they need to hear changes too.

Don't ever make the mistake of thinking you can finish Jesus' sentences.

"With many such parables he spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it."



For those trying to support and protect their families, we pray they find communities to embrace them. For those searching for peace and hope, we pray that we may be bearers of the Good News.




